Your support helps push the boundaries of what's possible.

From the moment a patient is diagnosed, we're there every step of the way. We create more opportunities for better outcomes. One way we do this is by providing patient assistance grants to help families cover out-of-pocket expenses related to transplant.

Since these grants became available, **248 patients** in **Arizona** have received financial assistance totaling **\$542,545 to help more patients** go through the transplant process. Of these patients, **15% were children**.

- Since 1987, NMDP has facilitated more than 125,000 transplants. In 2023, NMDP impacted 7,435 lives through cell therapy.
- Today, patients have access to more than
 41 million potential donors worldwide.
- In 2023, NMDP provided \$5.5 million in patient assistance grants to more than 2,600 families.

 the program.
- NMDP finds cures and saves lives. NMDP manages the most diverse listing of potential donors in the world (the national registry).
- We treat and cure over 75 diseases through cell therapy.
- Accelerating Progress: Underscoring NMDP's commitment
 to expanding access to cell therapy, we recently published
 findings showing that using expanded matching criteria
 could result in a nearly three-fold increase in the likelihood
 of securing a suitable donor. This breakthrough dramatically
 increases the chances of finding a match on the national
 registry, offering cell transplantation as a viable, life-saving
 therapy, regardless of ancestry.



Melissa Caregiver, Arizona

When Melissa's seven-year-old daughter, Anna, began experiencing persistent high fevers, she knew that something was not right with her little girl.

After months of tests, Anna's medical team told the family that she had chronic active Epstein-Barr virus, a rare disease where the body is unable to control infection in the bloodstream and organs. A bone marrow transplant was her only hope for survival.

Without a match in the family, they turned to NMDP and found two perfect matches. Unfortunately, neither were available.

Critically needing a solution, Anna's medical team decided to look for additional donors on the registry who at least closely matched Anna. Klaus was the one who answered the call — all the way from Germany.

Melissa is deeply grateful that Klaus was able to step up, and in 2019 her family got to share that gratitude as they met Klaus for the first time in person on The TODAY Show.

Now a freshman in high school, Anna is thriving. A competitive dancer, she spends 15 to 20 hours per week at the dance studio while earning straight A's. Inspired by her donor, Anna studies German and hopes to visit Klaus in Germany before graduation.

"She's doing all the normal high school things, and we couldn't be more grateful. We probably get weepier than most parents at seemingly normal moments – mostly because there was a time in her life when we weren't sure if she would ever get to experience them."
