Your support helps push the boundaries of what's possible.

From the moment a patient is diagnosed, we're there every step of the way. We create more opportunities for better outcomes. One way we do this is by providing patient assistance grants to help families cover out-of-pocket expenses related to transplant.

Since these grants became available, **226 patients in Missouri** have received financial assistance totaling **\$585,175 to help more patients** go through the transplant process. Of these patients, **23% were children.**

- Since 1987, NMDP has facilitated more than 125,000 transplants. In 2023, NMDP impacted 7,435 lives through cell therapy.
- Today, patients have access to more than **41 million** potential donors worldwide.
- In 2023, NMDP provided **\$5.5 million** in patient assistance grants to more than **2,600 families**.

- Entrusted by Congress for 35+ years: Since the inception of the C.W. Bill Young Cell Transplantation Program (the national registry), Congress has authorized NMDP to oversee the program.
- NMDP finds cures and saves lives. NMDP manages the most diverse listing of potential donors in the world (the national registry).
- We treat and cure over 75 diseases through cell therapy.
- Accelerating Progress: Underscoring NMDP's commitment to expanding access to cell therapy, we recently published findings showing that using expanded matching criteria could result in a nearly three-fold increase in the likelihood of securing a suitable donor. This breakthrough dramatically increases the chances of finding a match on the national registry, offering cell transplantation as a viable, life-saving therapy, regardless of ancestry.



Kristin Caregiver and courier, Missouri

Kristin serves as a volunteer NMDP courier acting as a bridge between patient and donor, and honoring the memory of her two sons, Matthew and Andrew.

Andrew was diagnosed with hemophagocytic lymphohistiocytosis (HLH) by the time he was three months old. By six months, Andrew received his first transplant from a match found on the national registry.

Kristin's husband, Justin, vividly remembers being in the hospital when the coordinator walked into the room, letting them know the cord blood cells had arrived. Two months after Andrew's first transplant, he needed a second one. Sadly, it was also unsuccessful.

Kristin and Justin had their older son, Matthew, tested to see if he was a match. Instead, the couple was stunned to learn that Matthew also carried the HLH mutation. They found themselves in an unthinkable situation. Andrew was preparing for his third transplant in under three years and Matthew for his first. Their family turned to NMDP four times and were helped every single time.

Though Andrew's third transplant was successful, he tragically passed away at the age of two due to other complications from the disease. Matthew passed away months later at the age of five.

As they moved forward, Kristin and Justin channeled their grief by helping others. They also regularly share their family's story to spread the word about NMDP's life-saving mission.

"Ultimately, Matthew and Andrew didn't survive, but I always tell people I am indebted to NMDP because they gave them an opportunity for a second chance at life."
