From the moment a patient is diagnosed, we're there every step of the way. We create more opportunities for better outcomes. One way we do this is by providing patient assistance grants to help families cover out-of-pocket expenses related to transplant.

Since these grants became available, 275
patients in North Carolina have received financial assistance totaling \$704,825 to help more
patients go through the transplant process. Of these patients, 30% were children.

- Since 1987, NMDP has facilitated more than 125,000 transplants. In 2023, NMDP impacted 7,435 lives through cell therapy.
- Today, patients have access to more than
 41 million potential donors worldwide.
- In 2023, NMDP provided \$5.5 million in patient assistance grants to more than 2,600 families.

 of the C.W. Bill Young Cell Transplantation Program (the
 national registry), Congress has authorized NMDP to
 oversee the program.
- NMDP finds cures and saves lives. NMDP manages the most diverse listing of potential donors in the world (the national registry).
- We treat and cure over 75 diseases through cell therapy.
- Accelerating Progress: Underscoring NMDP's commitment
 to expanding access to cell therapy, we recently published
 findings showing that using expanded matching criteria
 could result in a nearly three-fold increase in the
 likelihood of securing a suitable donor. This breakthrough
 dramatically increases the chances of finding a match
 on the national registry, offering cell transplantation as a
 viable, life-saving therapy, regardless of ancestry.



Daniel

Donor and advocate, North Carolina

As a senior in high school, Daniel was trying to identify a topic for a speech assignment when he saw a news segment about NMDP. Intrigued, he focused on NMDP's life-saving mission for his speech and decided to join the national registry.

Once in college, Daniel helped start Indiana
University's NMDP Chapter. In the spring of 2014,
he received news that he had matched with a
patient waiting for a transplant. After completing
his donation, Daniel was quickly told the transplant
was a resounding success.

In June 2015, Daniel realized the full impact of his gift when he met his recipient, Missy. A mother of three teenage children, Missy had been battling stage three Hodgkin's lymphoma since 2010.

The two immediately formed a close bond. They wanted to inspire others to join the registry. That July, Missy and her family went to Indiana to cheer on Daniel as he completed the Ironman 70.3 and raised nearly \$10,000 for NMDP.

Tragically, Missy fell ill unexpectedly and died on May 10, 2016. She was buried in her favorite NMDP T-shirt. Her family said they wanted to honor the organization and Daniel who gave them two more precious years with Missy. In 2020, Daniel competed in the Ironman once again, with the team raising over \$80,000 for NMDP.

Now a medical resident at Duke University, Daniel carries Missy's memory with him as he continues to advocate for blood cancer and blood disease patients.
