From the moment a patient is diagnosed, we're there every step of the way. We create more opportunities for better outcomes. One way we do this is by providing patient assistance grants to help families cover out-of-pocket expenses related to transplant.

Since these grants became available, **234 patients** in Virginia have received financial assistance totaling **\$574,654 to help more patients** go through the transplant process. Of these patients, **23% were children.**

- Since 1987, NMDP has facilitated more than 125,000 transplants. In 2023, NMDP impacted 7,435 lives through cell therapy.
- Today, patients have access to more than
 41 million potential donors worldwide.
- In 2023, NMDP provided \$5.5 million in patient assistance grants to more than 2,600 families.

- Accelerating Progress: Underscoring NMDP's commitment
 to expanding access to cell therapy, we recently published
 findings showing that using expanded matching criteria
 could result in a nearly three-fold increase in the likelihood
 of securing a suitable donor. This breakthrough dramatically
 increases the chances of finding a match on the national
 registry, offering cell transplantation as a viable, life-saving
 therapy, regardless of ancestry.



Will Donor, Virginia

During combat training as a U.S. Marine at Camp Geiger in 2013, I heard several corpsmen deliver a presentation about an opportunity to join the national registry.

They explained that being on the registry as a potential donor could afford those who needed a bone marrow transplant the chance to live. It was an easy decision for me to sign up. Just 12 months later, I received a call notifying me that I was a possible match.

After learning I was a match, I had one thought. "Might this save someone's life?" The answer from the doctors was "yes," so the decision to donate my bone marrow was an easy choice.

Six years after the procedure, I had an opportunity to meet my bone marrow recipient, Mike, and his family at an annual reunion hosted at Duke University. I learned about the difficulties Mike faced and saw what a struggle the recovery had been for him.

My recovery took about a year before I was fully restored, but I felt that it was nothing in comparison to what Mike had to face. As part of my recovery, I trained for the 2015 Marine Corps Marathon and completed the race in honor of Mike.
