

From the moment a patient is diagnosed, we're there every step of the way. We create more opportunities for better outcomes. One way we do this is by providing patient assistance grants to help families cover out-of-pocket expenses related to transplant.

Since these grants became available, **50 patients** in New Mexico have received financial assistance totaling **\$103,355 to help more patients** go through the transplant process.



2023 National Impact

- Since 1987, NMDP has facilitated more than 125,000 transplants. In 2023, NMDP impacted 7,435 lives through cell therapy.
- Today, patients have access to more than
 41 million potential donors worldwide.
- In 2023, NMDP provided \$5.5 million in patient assistance grants to more than 2,600 families.

 national registry), Congress has authorized NMDP to oversee
 the program.

- Accelerating Progress: Underscoring NMDP's commitment
 to expanding access to cell therapy, we recently published
 findings showing that using expanded matching criteria
 could result in a nearly three-fold increase in the likelihood
 of securing a suitable donor. This breakthrough dramatically
 increases the chances of finding a match on the national
 registry, offering cell transplantation as a viable, life-saving
 therapy, regardless of ancestry.

In 2011, Lan was a 21-year-old college student focused on getting into law school. Her plans changed when she was diagnosed with stage four Hodgkin's lymphoma, a potentially life-threatening cancer of the lymphatic system.

Six months of chemotherapy put her into remission for two years. Relapsing in 2014 and then again in 2017, Lan's doctors told her she would need a bone marrow transplant to survive. When she could not find a matching donor, Lan started chemotherapy in 2018, placing her into remission until a third relapse in 2022. Since then, she has been searching for a donor as her cancer spreads to her lungs and spleen.

As she continues to search, Lan holds regular donor drives with the hope of finding a match while helping other patients like her.

She also regularly advocates at the state and national level to ensure blood cancer and disorder patients can receive their life-saving transplants. "Rather than sulking over my health issues, I want to take action," she said. "As a searching patient, I know that lives like mine depend on supporting cell therapy."

Lan has been championing policy change, including pushing for paid sick leave when she was a city council member in Albuquerque. Now, she serves as a policy director for a nonprofit and is currently working to support legislation for paid family medical leave in New Mexico.

For now, Lan said she and her husband, Joey, take life one day at a time.

"My doctor has been trying to save my life since
I was diagnosed. But a policymaker could save
thousands of lives with a simple mark of their pen.
It's policy change and funding that would truly
save my life by helping NMDP find my donor."
